Peter Boreham is one of St Bs churchwardens and is part of the church@five team on Strawberry Vale. In this interview we find out a little bit about what is happening.



So Peter, why haven't we

seen so much of you at St Bs lately?

I'm part of the team running church@five, our latest congregation which meets every Sunday afternoon on the Strawberry Vale estate.

What does a typical church@five meeting look like?

It's very informal with cabaret-style seating around tables, gallons of tea and coffee, and lots of kids running around. We start with some worship led from the guitar or keyboard followed by prayer and a short talk. Finally we eat together. There's also kids work during the service.

What's the best bit?

Every week someone volunteers to be our pray-er of the week and the following week they share what they've been praying for and what's happened. We've had some outstanding answers to prayer - last week someone shared about their son being set free from alcohol addiction and the week before someone in chronic pain told us they'd been set free from it!

Who comes?

We normally have about 30-40 people. Around half live on the estate and the rest are people from St Bs who have committed to be part of church@five.

What's your job?

All sorts – leading, preaching, clearing away, mopping up spillages etc!

What else is happening?

We have midweek groups for mums & toddlers, boys, girls and teenagers. There are monthly open house brunch meetings, we had a Christmas party, and 'Christmas Lunch on Jesus' when we distributed Christmas goodies to every home on the estate!

Can I get involved?

We're always looking for "Godparents" who will pray for the estate, the services and the leadership team. You can also offer to help with one of the midweek groups. For more information, please email neighbourhood@stbarnabas.co.uk. We do welcome visitors on Sundays, but if you start visiting regularly we'll find plenty for you to do!



No room at the inn

It's a sad fact that our frantic western culture has devalued time spent sharing our lives with others, in favour of a mad dash for greater achievement and prosperity. It would be a positive result if the crunching realities of the current economic downturn caused us to reassess life's priorities, and although this may be a vain hope for society at large, at least within the church I believe we can model a different way of living.

In September I preached on hospitality as a means of fulfilling not only Jesus' command to love others, but a crucial plank of mission. The sermon clearly struck a chord (it's still available as a download from the website) as I received a lot of feedback from people who felt dissatisfied with the isolated self sufficiency of modern life. What follows are extracts from an emailed response that particularly struck me.

"It feels as if, in our busy London lives, we all live in our separate bubbles, and no-one intrudes on anyone else's - purely because it would require courage, emotional energy, and time that we haven't got. I long for – I believe the Lord longs for us to have – a lifestyle in which we overcome the barriers between us and 'love one another sincerely, from the heart'. I think this would require a radical difference in the way we think about church.

I don't think that means dropping the idea of mission until we are a close-knit community, I think that means doing mission as a family of people needing each other, rather than as a team of (or handful of individual) professionals."

Living open and vulnerable lives where hospitality is a hallmark of our very nature is massively inconvenient. Yet that putting ourselves out for others is what Jesus did all the time. No one was too small or poor or lowly for him literally to stop

everything he was doing and turn his attention purely on them. People invaded his personal space, interrupted his 'chill out time', and took advantage of his loving nature. Yet he continued to reach out with both arms, without counting the cost, and often receiving rejection in return. Meanwhile I see in myself the inclination to close ranks and shut people out with the rebuttal "no room at the inn". My calloused heart has warm patches, but they are buried under a hard London exterior that only God's Holy Spirit can melt.

How we need to be changed to become more like Jesus, to set aside our own desires, preferences, comforts and time for the sake of loving others. The personal cost of this is astronomic, but the prize is greater still - a loving assault on loneliness.



One of our hopes for the new Missional Communities is that by being intentionally outward looking, we will start not only to break down the barriers between the outsider and the church community, but also soften the barriers in our own hearts.

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From the Vicar

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By Jess Mariano The beginning of a long journey for the Ireton family

Kenya may be a great place to spend a holiday, with its stunning landscapes, amazing animals and vibrant people – but would you up sticks, leave everyone you know behind, and move out there? Well, Elliott and Jo Ireton are doing just that! Taking their children Alice (5), Minnie (2) and Isaac (five months), they are leaving for Naivasha, Kenya, this spring. For the last six years Elliott Ireton has been St Bs' children's pastor, while his wife Jo has been teaching at a primary school and co-ordinating the church's under-fives work. So why did they decide to move to Africa?

Elliott explains: 'The last six years at St Barnabas have been a fantastic time of learning and growing for the whole family – literally, in the case of our three beautiful children, who have all been born since we've been here! But over two years ago we began to feel it was time to move on from our home and jobs in Finchley. We've been exploring what that next step might be, and part of that process involved a trip to Kenya in May 2010.'

Elliott and Jo visited the Helping Hands Organisation of Kenya in Naivasha. Since 2005 Helping Hands has been co-led by St Bs overseas members Bernie and Celia Mascher; it was set up in 1997 by Bernie's parents, Dr Hellmut and Elise Mascher, who had worked in Kenya since the 1960s and were moved by the difficulties facing disabled Kenyans and the general need for education and training. KENYA FACTS!

- Kenya gained independence from the UK on 12 December 1963
- 2. The country is home to seven major ethnic groups
- 40% of Kenyans live in poverty (on less than \$2 a day)

Helping Hands was founded with the vision of bringing 'empowerment through education.' It has a primary school integrating disabled and non-disabled children; vocational training; and other ministries which have grown up in response to local need. Theological training is provided for Kenyan pastors, and the centre hosted reconciliation conferences following the post-election clashes in 2008.

Having been to Helping Hands myself, I can imagine how the Iretons may have felt on their visit. I found that a sense of God's peace envelops you from the moment you enter the gates. It is a vibrant place with its white walls, orange roofs, and green shrubs, where everyone seems to be smiling. The story of one little boy struck me as an example of how Helping Hands changes people's lives. Before he started at the school, this child was left at home all day because his disabilities were seen as shameful by his parents. Since his first silent, withdrawn days at school, he has become a happy, chatty, if not downright cheeky, little boy!

Elliott says: 'During our week in Naivasha we were incredibly excited by what we saw, and on our return we quickly realised that we had to go back and volunteer our skills to support Bernie and Celia. It's a great opportunity to work on such an inspiring project, especially as we can do it together as a family.'

Since their decision, Elliott and Jo have ploughed a lot of energy into getting ready. In September, Jo resigned from her teaching job and Elliott became part-time, and they began a cross-cultural course at All Nations College. They are also thinking about raising support: Helping Hands is a charity and, as volunteers, the Iretons will be financially dependent on friends, family and supporters. Once in Kenya, they will need to learn Swahili and face big cultural differences. There will be sacrifices: 'It's hard to think that our families won't see the kids so regularly as they are growing up,' says Elliott, 'but email and Skype will help. The new broadband cables they are laying in Naivasha will make a huge difference in communication.'

Life in Kenya will look quite different for the Ireton family. Alice and Minnie will spend their mornings at the Helping Hands school, and their afternoons being home-schooled alongside the Maschers' children, Abbie and Theon. Elliott's great practical and IT skills will be put to the test at the centre – on his first visit, he helped Bernie build a toilet! He will also be working with the students there, drawing on his experience of training young adults through the Equip scheme at St Bs. Jo's experience as a teacher will be invaluable. She says, 'I think getting involved in the school will be a great challenge for me. I am so used to my smart board, and in Kenya they use chalk. I'll have to be quite creative as it'll be back to basics!'

Barney's: play, fun, mess... lifeline

As any parent knows, the early years of our children's lives are not always the easiest. Support from others can be a lifeline. When my older child was two and the younger one just born, we moved to an isolated part of Finchley Central. There was nowhere to walk to except the cemetery. My husband was often away with work and I had no other friends who had children, or any adults to spend time with. I now think I was heading for a breakdown - of both my marriage and my mental health - when a friend finally persuaded me to go to Barney's toddler group. I was reluctant, as other groups I'd tried were cliquey and unfriendly.

Barney's, however, was amazing. They were so welcoming, never letting anyone sit on their own. There was such a warmth to the group, which I now know was the Holy Spirit's presence. Within two weeks I felt I'd always been there! I found friendships; I was invited to family events at the church, and then to an Alpha course, where I met with Jesus in March 2003.

Now, seven years on, I have the privilege of leading Barney's as part of my ministry. Every Wednesday and Friday morning, a team of St Bs volunteers welcome 65 under fives and their parents or carers into the church. Through toys, crafts, messy play and singing, with a fruit snack for the children and plenty of tea and coffee for the adults, we aim to help both adults and children make friends, have fun and relax.

Barney's members are all local mums, dads, grandparents, childminders and nannies; they are from all round the world and of many different faiths. Our aim is to offer support, care and hope to all, and also to express the love of Christ through our actions: building relationships, sharing parenting advice and life experiences, and both laughing and crying with the families who attend. We all regularly share our personal testimonies to God's grace if they are pertinent to any conversation we may be having. God can use all situations to His glory.

On the first Wednesday and Friday of each month, we host Toddler Praise, an interactive ten-minute slot with God for everyone. We sing worship songs, tell them about Jesus (with the help of lots of mess), pray, and finally send everyone off with a small gift which relates to the story. It is just the most amazing monthly event!

Through our relationships with our members, we are able to invite them to other family events at St Bs like our Family Services, Family Craft Morning, FamilyFESTs and GAP/MiniGAP. Many attend these and thoroughly enjoy them. We also have the privilege of being able to offer prayer for (and with) many of our members, for healing, family issues, school places, employment, and so on. We have seen lots of answered prayers. We recently prayed for one dad who had been out of work for 18 months - the very next day he was offered a job which has since become a permanent contract – praise God! Another wonderful lady who after many miscarriages was sure she would never have another baby is now six months pregnant! We have seen prodigals returned, families restored and people give their lives to Jesus.

There is no special formula for opening someone's eyes to the love of Jesus, but I have found that serving people, loving them, supporting them, praying for them and telling them about what Jesus has done for me is like planting lots of seeds.

"After having my second child in less than one and a half years, I was feeling very overwhelmed and having trouble leaving the house. Barney's was the first place I successfully took them both by myself. I'm very grateful for the warm and supportive environment."

"My son enjoys coming to Barney's very much. We are Japanese and we have a limited time staying here. So it's wonderful to have such a lovely time sharing with other people who speak other languages."

What's the Bible all about?

It can be quite confusing can't it? For a few weeks the Bible readings at church are all from the book of Ezra in the Old Testament. Then for a few weeks we're looking at the Acts of the Apostles in the New Testament. And maybe you're left wondering: "Is there one storyline which ties the whole Bible together?" Well I think there is ... and I think it's the story of God's rule as King over the earth.

Part 1

The story starts with God creating "the heavens and the earth" (Genesis 1:1). As creator, God is the rightful king over the earth and all people on earth (Psalm 47:7, Psalm 100:3). God's plan was that humanity, the pinnacle of his creation, should live under his rule, and should rule over his earth (Genesis 1:26). It all went wrong when Satan persuaded humanity to listen to him instead of listening to God, and humanity disobeyed God (Genesis 3).

The awful consequence of this was that Satan had usurped authority over the earth. That's why the Bible calls him "the god of this age" and the "prince of this world" (2 Corinthians 4:4, John 12:31) and tells us that this world is "under the control of the evil one" (1 John 5:19).

God then sets in motion his plan to recover his rule over the earth. The first phase of the plan began when God chose one man, Abraham, (Genesis 12) and the people descended from him, the people of Israel, and made an agreement or "covenant" with them that they would be his people and would live under his rule. Life under God's rule is summed up in the Ten Commandments (Exodus 19:3-6).

The rest of the Old Testament is the account of how Israel lived as God's covenant people (Joshua, Judges, 1&2 Kings). It also records God's conversation with his people about the covenant. He spoke to them through prophets (eg Isaiah, Jeremiah) to point out when they failed to live up to his covenant and to call them back.

He spoke to them through poets (eg Psalms, Song of Songs) who expressed the joys and the challenges of living in covenant relationship with God. And he spoke to them through wise philosophers (Proverbs, Ecclesiastes) who wrote down their thinking about what life could look like if lived under God's rule.

Sadly, the general pattern was that Israel repeatedly failed to live up to their calling as God's people. They chose not to live under God's rule, and as a result they suffered exile from their land. However, even during exile, God continued to speak to them through prophets (Daniel, Ezekiel) and the Old Testament ends with the story of how they were restored to the Land (Ezra & Nehemiah).

Part 2

Approximately 400 years after the last events recorded in the Old Testament, God initiates the second and final phase of his plan to recover his rule over the earth, by sending his son, Jesus. All four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke & John) tell the story of how Jesus declared God's rule as King in his preaching and teaching, and then demonstrated it in his obedient life, in his compassionate healings and in his powerful miracles. Finally, by his death, Jesus broke the power of the enemy of the Kingdom of God (Hebrews 2:14-15, 1 John 3:8), and initiated a new covenant between God and people.

Is there one storyline which ties the whole Bible together?

But the story doesn't end there. God the Father raised Jesus from the dead, and appointed him to rule over all things (Ephesians 1:22). Jesus gathers a new people,

in a new covenant relationship with God the Father, and fills them with the Holy Spirit. These people are empowered both to live under God's rule as King, and to continue Jesus' work of declaring and demonstrating God's rule. Through apostles who wrote to the followers of Jesus (eg Paul's letters to the Christians in Rome, Corinth etc) Jesus encourages and exhorts them to live out God's rule in their daily lives.

And how will it all end? Jesus will continue to rule until all his enemies are subject to him (1 Corinthians 15:25). Then, after Satan's final fling (2 Thessalonians 2), Jesus will hand the rule (the "kingdom") back to God the Father (1 Corinthians 15:24-28). And it all ends with a new beginning (Revelation 21) when God creates a new heaven and a new earth, and God's people enjoy unbroken fellowship with God, living under his rule for ever.

And that's what the Bible's all about!

A History of Change

There is a saying around St Barnabas that I heard pretty soon after arriving here: "constant change is here to stay"!

The original church building was a corrugated iron chapel that had stood on the site from 1885 until the present St Barnabas Church was built and consecrated in 1914.

This was at the end of the Edwardian era and the building has been a place of worship ever since. Because of when it was built, it reflects the style of worship back then. The emphases were on the majesty and remoteness of God, and the separation of the clergy from the congregation. This is definitely not the message we want to proclaim now.

Looking at some of the earliest photographs, it becomes clear just how much has changed since then! The original configuration of the interior had wooden chairs. These were purchased with the aid of a grant on condition that at least half were made available free of charge! Amazing though it may seem to us now, people had to pay for the privilege of sitting in those days. There were also choir benches, where the worship team stand today and a high pulpit to the left of the current platform. All this has changed. The Parish Hall and kitchen were created out of the main church, along with the gallery in 1961. The Pierce Hall was built alongside the main building in the 1980s. Then, of course, in the last ten years three pre-fab buildings have been added at the back of the site to accommodate the growing need for ministry space.

Recent Changes

In 2009 we added a conservatory between the Woodside Hall and the Youth Hall to provide more space for youth ministry. At the same time more office space had to be created and over 20 people were moved into new spaces. This process is still continuing.

Current Changes

Over the last few months you may have noticed more change happening in the main church. Our goal is to transform our worship space through reasonably small and affordable changes to decor and layout, to enhance intimacy and connectedness between those that minister and the congregation. These works have been made possible by a generous donation earlier this year, set aside for reordering the worship space. This includes:

1) The AV desk (the control centre for the PA, lighting and visual projection equipment) was dismantled and a new enclosure has been built to one side of its original position.

2) Welcome Area: The AV desk move was to allow the creation of a new welcome area alongside it which now also houses the bookshop. Our goal was to provide an area where visitors to the church could be met by hosts (our new 'meeters and greeters' team) and where they could explore what we are about, through literature and displays (both static and electronic). This area is already in use and is a hive of activity each Sunday.

3) Painting the inside of the church, to break the dark, drab colour of the unpainted walls, and so create a friendlier, warmer atmosphere.

4) Lighting improvements to the congregation seating area and also to the platform lighting; this is to create a warmer and more intimate environment by bringing the lighting lower.

5) We also plan to redesign the platform layout to accommodate our style of worship. This will involve moving the projector and screen to the centre of the platform and erecting a new, more permanent, backdrop.

6) Lastly, we want to replace our chairs, as our old ones have simply worn out. Alongside the new chairs in the main seating area, we also want to create a new lounge area where our current coffee servery has been in recent years – see sketch from Henry below.




Any of these works are being done in-house' and at very low cost.

In all this we recognise that decorating and moving around the furniture in itself doesn't really change anything. And yet we believe that in this case we're not engaged in a mere home-improvement scheme, but in something God has prompted us to do. We want our church building to be welcoming and attractive both for our members and for all who visit us. Our prayer is that it will also become a place of encounter with the living God.

I saw God at work

The phrase that comes to mind when I read these stories is 'eye witnesses of his majesty' (2 Peter 1:16). These members of St Bs got a close-up of God's goodness as they served him:

I grew up in a non-church going family but always had a feeling that God was around me. About 10 years ago, I met a Christian through

a band that I played with occasionally; it was then I realised that I had a deep longing to be close with God.

I started praying, but couldn't find a local church where I felt at home. With no-one close to talk to about my search, I became side-tracked by 'spiritual' courses and books as I tried to make sense of the difficulties from the past that continued to affect me. I sought love in unsuitable relationships which took me even further away from God. But he was on my case and sent me some people who would lead me to Jesus. I stumbled upon Christ Church Fulham's website and began listening to their sermons online, which deeply inspired and kept me on the right path.

Then earlier this year, completely out of the blue, I received a text from someone I'd met years ago whose name I didn't recognise. He wanted to know who the mystery 'Liz' was in his phone contacts. As we attempted to work out by text who the other was, he described himself - amongst other things - as 'Jesus lover'! Surprised and delighted by this and his boldness, I called him. We talked at length; he invited me to his church, prayed for me and has continued encouraging me.

On 18 July 2010, after listening online to Richard Pennystan from CCF, I followed his suggestion to put out two chairs, invite Jesus in and speak with him as I would a friend. My sadness and regret about the way I had been living over the years poured out; I asked for forgiveness and for him to stay in my life and help me live in a new way. I could feel his love and compassion for me - and then I had an unmistakable encounter with him, in which he led me to the Father, leaving me in no doubt that I had been heard. Within three weeks I'd found St Barnabas, where I received a warm, personal welcome and the fellowship I'd been seeking.

I'm getting to know Jesus day by day and am overwhelmed by his love, by what he has done for us, and what this means for me and all who come to him. Since my baptism at St Bs on 14 November, I have felt a deep peace and wholeness in Christ that I never knew I could have. God speaks to me regularly and I hear him with increasing clarity. I know he guides me by the Holy Spirit in many different ways and I'm now living to serve Him.

I love what he's doing in me as I notice myself changing and growing in his love and I find myself waking each morning thanking Jesus, and knowing that no matter what challenges I will face as I live the way He calls, Jesus really is the way, the truth and the life for me.

What the youth get up to behind the church on a Sunday afternoon

"They are the ones who can really impact their friends."



You could be forgiven for thinking that, like most churches, St Bs settles down for some peace and quiet after the morning congregation heads home for Sunday lunch, until the 7pm service ... but you couldn't be more wrong. From 3.30pm every Sunday there is a steady stream of young people heading up the side path towards the group of huts between St Bs and the railway line. They are getting ready – praying, preparing, practising – for their very own services which take place at 5pm.

There are two services. The Five is in the Youth Hall, for those aged between 14 and 18, and Y66, for those between 11 and 14, meets in the Tubeside Hall. "I love the fact that, at 5pm every Sunday, a strange collection of Portacabins comes alive with young people!" enthuses Liz Bewley, St Bs' youth pastor.

The Five service is a little different from what the adults are used to. They tend to start with some games and relationshipbuilding exercises, followed by a low-key but relevant talk, and then to an extended time of prayer and worship –

but this is church that is accessible to them and that draws them closer to God. The ethos of The Five is to train the young people for leadership. They are given the responsibility of running the service themselves - deciding on activities, preparing and giving the talk, praying and ministering to others, leading worship, and setting up and clearing away. With the guidance of an enabling team they are "doing church for themselves". As Liz points out - "They are the ones who can really impact their friends". About 50% of the young people who attend The Five are from families within St Bs; the others have mainly been brought along by their friends. Half of the young people will then choose to stay on for the evening service at St Bs, helping them to feel part of the wider church community and preparing them for moving on beyond the youth work into the next stage of their church lives.

Y66, for 11s to 14s, bridges the gap between Kids Church and The Five (Y66 members came up with the name - Y'stands for asking questions and '66' for all the books in the Bible!). Much like The Five, the older members of Y66 are encouraged to start moving into leadership roles, speaking and leading worship. The vision for Y66 is to help young people "go deeper": walking with and supporting them as they make the transition to secondary schools where they suddenly face more challenges and choices in their lifestyles, friendships, faith, relationships and so on.

The stage between 11 and 14 can be difficult for many young people, struggling with no longer feeling like a child but at the same time not being fully autonomous. "We address all of those issues within the context of discipling them to go deeper into a living relationship with Jesus," Liz explains.

Y66 has a buzz right from the start. People are eager to be there; the band is made up of their own members, and the service proceeds with plenty of fun, fellowship, food and worship. "Y66 is what church should be," Liz points out. "It's about family, having fun together and meeting Jesus.

As well as the Sunday services the 14 to 18-year-olds from The Five have their equivalent to Barnabas groups. "Ignition" meets on a Tuesday evening and enables the young people to form deeper relationships as they pray, worship and spend time drawing closer to God in small groups. Starting within the next few weeks, the Year 9 students (13-year-olds) from Y66 will be starting their own small group mid-week for the same purpose.



I had my first real encounter with God last year. I had a dream, where one of my friends was showing me a church, explaining that I needed to get closer to my spiritual side. For the first time I felt that I was really drawn to the idea of God's

existence. Although I have been brought up in a Christian family, my parents attend a different church that unfortunately I had not been able to connect with. And so my friend and I decided to come to the Sunday morning sessions where we found out about the Five youth group. On my first day at the Five I was nervous, feeling that I would not fit in, but I was surprised to see how welcoming and nice everyone was. It has been a year and a bit since I have been going to the Five and Ignition, and with the help of Liz and my friends at the group, not only have I grown more as a person but my faith in God has developed into something indexcribable. Although I still have a lot to learn, I'm now sure that every significant event that has taken place in my life has been because of the Holy Spirit. I was baptized on the 14th of November, and I hope that with that my relationship with God develops even more.

The plan is that this will enable them to also learn more leadership skills, to be put into practice on a Sunday evening.

Liz is hugely enthusiastic about the impact of both The Five and Y66. "Watching them engage with God in their own way is the most inspiring thing - whether that is understanding the love of Jesus for the first time, or discovering yet another way he can impact their lives now as teenagers. For me, this is what youth work is all about."


